

Aurora St. William



(Brookings County) St. William

Aurora was founded in 1877 by Irish Catholics from Wisconsin. When the Chicago and Northwestern line passed through the settle-known to have been offered in Aurora was said in 1880 by Father M. P. Despite hard times the Catholics of Aurora, who had their church destroyed in a storm in 1884, were determined to have a house of worship. They found holding services in a schoolhouse was unsatisfactory. ship. They found holding services into schoolhouse was unsatisfactory. Father Michael Quinlan was ingenious in supplying their need without an outlay of much money. He purchased an abandoned schoolhouse, had it moved to the church site and, after remodeling it, produced a church that served until 1910. The priests of Elkton administered to St. in 1904...a parsonage was built in Aurora in 1928.

Because of a dwindling membership and a scarcity of priests, St. William's had no resident pastor after 1964. It was attended from Elkton. The parish house was rented. (CD)


CENTENNIAL OF ST. ANN'S CHURCH OF BADUS LAKE COUNTY, SOUTH DAKOTA

1884 - 1984

St. Ann's parish began its history with the advent of settlers to Dakota Territory. In the fall of 1877 a group of Swiss colonists, who had located temporarily at Stillwater, Minnesota, sent a small group to Dakota Territory for the purpose of investigating homestead land available for settlement. Their journey to Dakota Territory led them to the east shore of present day Lake Badus. Ten men filed homestead claims around the Lake in 1877 and a good report of lands was taken back to Stillwater. In the spring of 1878 Joseph Burkler and family, Chris Fazendin, Anthony Tuor and Jacob Tuor were sent out by the colonists to build houses, make improvements and break land. Mrs. Burkler was the first woman in the settlement. Joseph Muggli in the same year was largely instrumental in organizing the Colony, incorporated as Ligia Greischa (union, organization and canton or place). The purpose of incorporating was for constructing a church, school and colony house. The language of the settlement was Romansch.

The name of Lake Badus was taken from a mountain of a similar name in Switzerland. One of the first frame buildings erected in the settlement was the school house. The lumber was purchased in Stillwater and shipped to Volga, the nearest railway point to the Colony. The school house was used temporarily for mass and church activities. The Badus school served as a public elementary school until destroyed by fire in 1948. The first mass and baptismal service was held on May 20, 1880, at the school by Father John Brogan of Sioux Falls, who made periodic visits to the settlement. Those baptized were Christina Burkler, the first child born in Badus, Mary Palli, Anna Giossi and Anna Schnell. Also from the early register of St. Ann's the following was recorded: "On May 9th, 1880, Rose Tobin, daughter of Edward and Mary Tobin was baptized, on May 21st following day Clara Theresa Lawless of Richard and Bridget Croke." The first marriage, in May, 1881, was Casper Cassutt and Barbara Fazendin. The first death was that of Jacob F. Berther, who died in 1881, leaving a widow and five sons, Casper, Martin, Bert, John and Tony. Mrs. Joe (Mary) DeRungs celebrated her 100th birthday on May 31, 1984. She is the oldest living parishioner of St. Ann's.




Kathleen Heffernan White recalled: "As children we came to the Catholic church in Elkton during good weather with a team of horses and a surrey. When the weather was bad, Monsignor Sheehan drove out to the Bill Farrell school house to serve the people from Aurora, Bushnell and White areas . . . Mother always packed a picnic lunch, and Dad wrapped a jug of beer in wet burlap. When we came to a shady grove, he buried the beer to keep it cool, and on our return trip home, we stopped for lunch. Dad enjoyed his cool beer, and we enjoyed our lunch-the first food of the day, since we had been fasting from midnight in order to go to communion.'

Carthage Sacred Heart

Sacred Heart, Carthage With Mass offered in a school house and in homes in 1881/2, priests came from Miner, Diana, Woonsocket, Madison, and Howard, whose Fr. Stecher dedicated a church on Nov. 4, 1892, with two German and 28 English families. From 1900 on, Woonsocket priests came until a rectory was built in 1914 with Fr. Charles Krouse and 14 families; and resident pastors remained until 1956, except while being a mission of DeSmet in the 1920's. St. Nicholas in Roswell was once a mission of Carthage. In 1956, Fr. Kolbeck came from Howard; a new church was built in 1958 and the rectory moved to Howard; in 1965 priests came from Oldham and in 1968 from DeSmet, including Fr. Joseph Murphy who had 40 families in 1973. In 1983 Fr, Arnold Petrosky and from 1989 Fr. Richard Schmidt served until Jan. 8, 1990 when the parish closed.







To the northwest of Howard, homesteaders in 1880 called their settlement Mable, but when it was opened two years later it was named Franklin. Catholics among the settlers were visited by Father John C. Ahern who offered the Holy Sacrifice in the home of James Coughlin and later on in the public schoolhouse. In 1883 a new townsite was platted a short distance west and called Carthage. Beginning with 1883 Carthage appears in the Catholic Almanac as a station attended, in turn, from Miner, Diana, Woonsocket, Madison and Howard. In 1892 Father Thomas F. Carthage was attended by Endist Fathers out of Woonsocket until 1914. When Father Charles Krouse was assigned to Sacred Heart Parish, 1914. When Father Charles Krouse was assigned to Sacred Heart Parish, the 14 Catholic families provided a home by building a rectory that year...Sacred Heart Parish had resident pastors from 1914 to 1956. Then Father Henry Kolbeck of Howard assumed charge. He inspired the people to build a new church in 1958. From 1966 to 1970 Sacred Heart was reported 40 Catholic households. (CD)
