


Bishop Paul SWAIN

'All saints' who have directly touched and influenced my own faith journey...



ovember is a time when we pray in thanksgiving for all those saints who though imperfect and not formally raised up by the Church sought to live holy lives. We also remember all those who have died, who are missed and honored because they have touched our lives. We remain one with them through the communion of the saints.

One definition of saints I appreciate is that they were ordinary persons who lived ordinary lives in an ordinary Christian way. The fact that they are viewed as extraordinary is because so few of us live in the ordinary Christian way.

Like us all there are certain declared saints that have influenced me, including St. Thomas More, St. Teresa of Calcutta, St. John Paul II. All three witnessed to the faith, a deep personal relationship with Jesus and love for His Church with humility, courage, and perseverance. They inspire me still.

Yet, I have been contemplating those 'all saints' who have directly touched and influenced my own faith journey. Let me name a few.

Hubert and Isabel Shawcross were my maternal grandparents who when they could have eased into retirement became caregivers of my five brothers and sisters and me after my parents were divorced in the aftermath of World War II. Those years were not easy ones for a 7 year old kid thrust into the uncertainty of growing up without parents regularly present. The impact of divorce on children ought not to be minimized. The impact cannot be ameliorated by legal agreements. I thank God that we were raised in an environment which was not without its tensions but had a stability that helped me during a difficult time.

Miss Olmstead was my junior high Eng-

lish teacher. I do not recall her first name. What I do recall is her having us regularly stand at a blackboard, chalk in hand and diagram sentences, identifying the proper role of nouns, adjectives, adverbs and verbs to learn with precision the basics of what is required to communicate clearly. It was from that often tedious form of study that I learned the beauty of language and the power of the written word. My guess is that the widespread acceptance of writing in 140 strophes without concern for grammar or spelling on Twitter would have disappointed her.

When I served in Vietnam as an air intelligence officer we shared an office with the South Vietnamese. They were at one end of the room and we Americans were at the other end. Contact was formal. I celebrated my birthday in the office and invited the Vietnamese to share in it which stunned a few. They graciously did and I became friends with the Vinh family. What moved me was that this family of husband, wife and two small boys were practicing Catholics and the parents' resolve to do what they could to ensure that the boys would be able to practice the faith. It was a witness that stayed with me on my conversion journey.

Lee Sherman Dreyfus was the governor of Wisconsin I was privileged to serve as legal counsel and director of policy. He had a delightful sense of humor and a deep perspective about what was really important, which have guided me ever since I volunteered in his campaign. He was not a professional politician but ran for governor after serving as president of a state university.

He taught and witnessed to insightful principles of dealing with the challenges that come to all of us. Among the lessons I learned from him was not what he accomplished in office but how he approached the tough times. He recalled the advice received from his father: when you get worked up about something ask yourself whether twenty years from now will this be important? Few things meet that standard. Salvation however does.

The second insight was from his service in World War II. He said that war with all its loss and destruction, which I could relate to, was a 10. Nothing since has been more than a 2. Perspective is important.

Father Paul Gilmartin, S.J. was a professor of spirituality and my spiritual director at now Saint John XXIII National Seminary in Massachusetts. He was a gentle and wise man who loved the Church and helping seminarians, especially late bloomers like me. I also remember how tough he was in grading our exams.

What I remember most though is how attentive he was to each person, encouraging us by noting the little things as well as helping discern the more serious ones. I recall when being unschooled in Catholic practices it was my turn to lead the daily office or prayer of the Church. One petition provided for the insertion of the local bishop by name. I was not sure what bishop I should name and so inserted Bishop Cletus O'Donnell who was not the local bishop but the bishop of the diocese of Madison for which I was studying. Other seminarians looked at me with expressions of shock. Father Gilmartin quietly took me aside and taught me the importance of protocol in the Church, which has served me well ever since.

Mark Musolf was a good friend of mine who hired me into his law firm fresh from school. He loved the environment and music. He sang in the choir at his Lutheran Church. He taught me that solo performances are not life giving and that





Remember those who are a part of your family

e sat in quiet as the sun was setting, casting its autumnal light through the colors of the stained glass windows surrounding us.

We sat in the beautiful quiet of St. James Church in Chamberlain, the bishop and the priests and deacons of the diocese. We sat in prayer, praying the Office of the Dead, as the sun set and the leaves outside mirrored our thoughts.

We sat, as we do each year, to pray and to listen; and to pray as we listen, because it was both. We listened as one of us stepped up a microphone and began to read a decade of names, and then the next walked up to the microphone to read another decade's worth.

We sat and prayed and listened, as we do each year, to the names of the priests, deacons, bishops and popes who have died since the creation of our diocese. It is always a thoughtful and beautiful time, and meaningful for us.

Many years ago I wrote about this tradition we celebrate each year at our Clergy Days gathering, but I wanted to share some thoughts that struck me this year as I listened and prayed. When we first began this tradition, it took quite a while before we got to names I recognized, in fact, they were mostly the last names prayed.

Lately, the familiar names come up a lot faster, and the emotional connection to hearing those names is stronger. As I heard the names, I smiled, not a smile either happy or sad, just thoughtful, just a moment's smile of remembering how a life impacted so many, and impacted me.

Now I hear the names John Garvey, who baptized me; John Kasch, who gave me my first Communion; Bishop Lambert Hoch, who confirmed me; Bishop Paul Dudley, who ordained me. Those Sacramental names matter to me

But I also hear other names; B. Alton Kelly, the pastor in Brookings who was the priest I spoke to about entering the seminary. I hear the name Robert Flannery, who taught me so much in just one summer, and who placed the priestly vestments upon me at my ordination. I hear the name Robert Haire, who I have succeeded as editor of "The Bishop's Bul-

letin" and who brought fiery faith to my home county.

I hear the name Francis Sampson, former chief of Chaplains for the US Army, who smiled upon me from his portrait hanging outside the classroom of the US Army Chaplain School in Fort Jackson, SC. I hear the names Joseph Schell and Henry Hoerner, who bequeathed to me the wonderful parish of Saint Mary I am honored to serve today, and upon who's graves I stand when I celebrate Memorial Day Mass in our cemetery chapel.

Those were just a few.

One of the reasons we began this tradition years ago was because priests generally do not have families to remember them and pray for them after death; since we are a part of a unique family, it is for us to remember and pray for them. In that past years, we have remembered many permanent deacons, who do have families, but the underlying motivation remains.

Yet, it occurs to me that while our initial reasoning might be completely true, it might not be completely valid. The fact that we belong to the unique family of the priesthood, and are brothers with all other priests, means that we are, in fact, also a part of many, many other families.

As I listened to those names, those moments became an encounter with priests who have touched my life. I am certain it would be a beautiful encounter for you as well. This November, this holy month when we pause to remember our beloved dead, I invite you to remember my brothers, the priests and deacons and bishops who did not leave this world without first touching your life.

Remember the priest or deacon who baptized you or your children, who blessed you with confessions and Eucharist, who confirmed you, witnessed your wedding, or a priest who brought you the gift of Christ in a trying time. There are many examples and encounters and I invite you to remember them this month.

As the names rolled on and on, I remembered that these were not perfect men, and so we pray for them. They were also men graced by ordination to bring Christ in a unique way to you, and so we pray for them.

They are a part of your family.



YOU ARE A MEMBER OF THE COMMUNION OF SAINTS

St. Peter, St. Cecelia, St. Kateri Tekakwitha, St. Francis, St. Therese of Lisieux, St. Josephine Bakhita, St. Faustina, St. John Paul II, Blessed Stanley Rother, Nicholas Black Elk, ...and you.

Everyone – it is the communion of saints and we all belong.

While the Church has formally declared many men and women as saints through the ages, it also teaches that the communion of saints is "the unity in Christ of all the redeemed, those on earth and those who have died." (CCC glossary)

The celebration of All Saints on November 1 and All Souls on November 2 provides a natural moment to consider our place in this wonderful communion.

"On November 1 we celebrate those souls in Heaven: the many, many men and women who have never been and may never be canonized but are in Heaven nonetheless. Then on November 2 we pray for those souls in purgatory: those men and women who will enter into Heaven once they have been completely perfected and healed of every fault.

"By celebrating these feasts 'back-to-back' we are reminded that we are all in this together, so to speak," said Dr. Christopher Burgwald, director of Adult Discipleship and Evangelization for the Diocese of Sioux Falls.

By baptism we become members of Christ's church and members of the communion of saints. Most of us, even living good and holy lives, will not be formally canonized saints after we die, yet the Church celebrates all the beautiful souls created by God - many of who are no doubt saints unknown.

"Through our baptism, we have each been joined to Christ, and because of that, we have likewise been joined to one another in a deeply profound manner.

"Every baptized person who is in a state of grace is thus bound to one another in Christ Jesus,

whether they are alive on earth or are in purgatory or Heaven. This is a bond that surpasses every possible natural bond, meaning that we are united with one another in a way that we can barely grasp," he said.

"Think about people in your life who were put there as examples or reflections of God's love for you," said Melanie Rigney, a South Dakota native and author of several works about saints.

"For many of us, it's parents, grandparents, other relatives, teachers, neighbors, colleagues, friends -sometimes they challenge us here on earth, but in what we later realize was needed correction and instruction," she said.

"I would go a step further - we are all saints in the making, as are those around us. Don't wait until they're dead to pray with and for them."

Rigney credits a happy set of circumstances as to how she began writing about saints but she intentionally continues to do so.

"They remain a focus of my writing because it's great formation for me... and because I feel called to introduce people to them, so the saints can in turn introduce others to a deeper relationship with the Lord", she said.

"I think initially, like many people, I expected them to be impossibly holy, never angry, never sad, never questioning, never lonely. And of course, nearly all of them experienced those emotions along with joy and love and laughter," said Rigney.

"Rather than impossibly holy, I found them to be magnificently human, and validation that our lives are all extraordinary, even those that appear most ordinary to others, as we draw closer and closer to Him."

The formal process of becoming a canonized saint in the Catholic Church has a number of steps along the way, but the Diocese of Rapid City has recently initiated the process for Nicholas Black Elk.

Deacon Marlin Leneaugh is the director of Native Ministries for the Rapid City diocese and said the time was right to start the process.

"I think folks are prepared for this to happen at this time at this place. Even though this is a diocesan event and an event for the Universal Church, it is also a huge event for Native People," he said.

"This is a positive event for the Native Community, it is an uplifting event that shows an ordinary man, and like many in our diocese can be a model of faith for so many."

Black Elk's story has inspired many. According to the petition presented to Bishop Robert Gruss last spring, Black Elk himself was at least partially inspired another Native American who is now a saint.

"Curious about Christianity, he began to watch and study. In 1885, he learned about Kateri Tekakwitha and signed the petition supporting the cause for her canonization. In 1904, he met a Jesuit priest who invited him to study Christianity at Holy Rosary Mission, near Pine Ridge, S.D. He did so, and on the feast of St. Nicholas, December 6, he was baptized Nicholas William. Saint Nicholas, appealed to him because he exhibited a model of Christian charity that resonated with grandpa's role as a traditional spiritual leader and his own generosity in service to the Native People," stated the petition, which was presented to Bishop Gruss by grandchildren of Black Elk.

"I think St. Kateri has paved the way for many Native martyrs and People of God to be recognized as saints by the Church," said Deacon Leneaugh.

"I think Black Elk speaks to the common individual, a local person born into poverty amidst war and strife to find Jesus who was the God of the enemy and be courageous enough to spread the Gospel and yet remain a Lakota man," he said.

Black Elk served as a catechist and traveled to reservations teaching and healing. He died in 1950.

"This cause would demonstrate to the Native communities and others that anything is possible



with God. We will have someone locally that we can proudly say, 'yeah, he's from here, my grandfather knew him or heard him preach.' It would instill a sense of pride throughout the Native Community," said Deacon Leneaugh.

Black Elk being inspired by St. Kateri, one saint inspiring a potential saint, is not unique according the research done by Rigney.

"Oh, the connections are awesome. I've been blogging recently about this... the married couples through the centuries who have been canonized. The people who did service together... where would Teresa of Avila and John of the Cross, or Vincent de Paul and Louis de Marillac, or Francis de Sales and Jane de Chantal have been without each other?

"Edith Stein may have never become Catholic, let alone a woman religious and saint (Teresa Benedicta of the Cross) without the writings of Teresa of Avila," Rigney said.

"The people who went on to be canonized who were inflamed by Therese of Lisieux are nearly innumerable. Anna Maria Taigi and Elisabeth Canori Mora, beatified friends in Rome, soldiered on through difficult home situations in part because of their friendship with each other.

"God puts people in our lives to invite us to learn to love Him more. It is a great gift, and it continues today. We all have people in our lives who inspire us. We are all called to holiness," she said.

Yet we often resist this call to holiness. We hesitate to think that a Holy Day like All Saints offers anything to us personally. We might not think we can live up to someone like a canonized saint - Mother Teresa or John XXIII or other saints that we have read about.

But Burgwald insists that "we should all aspire to great holiness; one of the reasons the Church canonizes some men and women is to hold them up as models for us to emulate. Second, though, the solemnity of All Saints reminds us that each and every person in Heaven is a saint in the sense that they now see God in all His glory, and that this is something that we are all called to."

"One of the things I find most compelling about the saints is the great variety in them: there's not just one way to be a saint, other than to love God and neighbor deeply and heroically," he said.

"Another aspect of the saints that fascinates me is their humility: they tended to see themselves as great sinners. But I have come to understand that because they drew so close to God, they came to see the faults and vices that they did have that much more clearly... when you're nearer to the light, that little speck of dust is more visible than it was when you were in the dark," Burgwald said.

Rigney said one of the surprises in now having studied hundreds of saints is that she finds herself drawn to some that she had previously avoided.

"St. Therese of Lisieux as a child I considered to be excessively sweet," she said.

"As an adult, and through studying her, I now

realize there's nothing excessively sweet about living the Little Way. It's perhaps the most courageous thing we can do.

"I also had avoided St. Faustina, which likely would have pained my Polish immigrant great-grandparents. There was something a little too close to home there for me... the single-minded pursuit. I'm good at single-mindedness, but unlike

Faustina, I care too much what others think of me. Growing closer to her has helped me with that," Rigney said.

"I am struck by the wisdom many have gathered through the saints. I think of one woman in particular who prayed with Blessed Chiara Badano, asking that the woman's husband's cancer be cured. But he died. The woman told me that after a time, her real prayer was that his suffering be relieved, and so it was," she said.

"My prayer is that people come to that understanding through the saints. Just because your financial situation or love life or health issue is not resolved in the way you ask in intercessory prayer does not mean the saint is not working overtime for you in intercession, or that your prayer is not heard.

"Also, it can be hard to grasp the enormity of the Trinity - after all, we're mere mortals. But understanding a woman who gave up her life for her daughter-in-law, a man who was a great father, a woman who took in orphans or nursed soldiers - that I think fascinates people, because it means they have a shot at holiness as well," Rigney said.

Whether we are conscious of it or not, the Church keeps saints and the idea of saints in front of us more often than just All Saints and All Souls days.


For example, each time we proclaim the Apostle's Creed we profess our belief in the communion of saints. And at each celebration of the Mass, the saints are recalled and invoked during the Eucharistic Prayer.

While the list of saints is long and growing, Burgwald suggests focusing on one or two might be a helpful approach.

"Doing so makes sanctity seem like something attainable for me. The path of holiness is unique to each of us, based on our own gifts, personalities, etc., but by looking to saints with similar circumstances in their own lives, we are more able to see how we can love as deeply as they did," he said.

"I like to think of the saints as our big brothers and sisters in the best sense of the term: they help us along our way and they set an example for us. Therefore I think it's important for us to seek their intercession and to look to them as models of holiness for us to aspire to," Burgwald said.

"Saints want to be our friends," said Rigney. "But like Jesus, they're not going to be pushy about it. Invite them in. Talk with them. Listen to them."

MAKE SURE THE CHURCH IS PART OF FUNERAL PREPARATIONS

One of the first calls I received when starting to work at the Chancery ten years ago was from an individual who was concerned because her friend had died and her family was not going to have the funeral at the parish church where her friend had attended Mass almost daily for the past 30 years.

The family was opting to just have a service at the funeral home, mostly for their own convenience she stated. Sadly this is becoming a more frequent occurrence both in our diocese and nationally.

A recent report by the National Funeral Directors Association (NFDA) stated "the number of Americans who feel it is important to have religion as part of a funeral was down from 49.5% in 2012 to 39.5%".

In the Order of Christian Funerals General Introduction, we hear the following: "the Church through its funeral rites commends the

dead to God's merciful love and pleads for the forgiveness of their sins. At the funeral rites, especially at the celebration of the Eucharistic sacrifice. the Christian community affirms and expresses the union of the Church on earth with the Church in heaven in the one great

communion of saints."

At the Vigil for the deceased we hear the following invitation to prayer: "My brothers and sisters, we believe all the ties of friendship and affection which knit us as one throughout our lives do not unravel with death."

As we enter this month of November and pray for the souls of those who have preceded us in death, I would strongly encourage us to make the arrangements necessary to assure the Church is a part of your funeral preparations. Each of us in death needs and desires the prayers of our Catholic community, as we believe the spiritual

bond still exists between the living and the dead. Our faith community also needs and desires an opportunity to grieve our absence from the community.



Identifying the gifts of stewardship

Have we been misunderstanding stewardship?

Stewardship is Prayer, Participation and Gratitude

The word stewardship is normally tied to donations, but that is a very narrow definition of a much larger teaching of the Catholic faith. In fact, stewardship is how we offer grateful prayers and gratitude for the gifts we have been given by God. Gratitude needs to begin with prayer which will lead to action. The surprise in this is where God leads you in active service and in ministry.

Recently, eight people from Holy Spirit Parish in Sioux Falls, the Catholic Diocese and the Catholic Community Foundation for Eastern South Dakota staffs attended the International Catholic Stewardship Conference. The take away lessons are inspirational and built on the foundation of prayer and participation in ministry. We are all gifted persons created in the image of God himself. Each gift we have been given is uniquely embedded in each of us by God and it is our responsibility to use it to the full potential.

Identifying those gifts can often be the most difficult part of being a good steward. Some of the most visible gifts and ministries in the church are musicians, readers and those willing to lead and teach. Not all of us have been blessed with the gifts to participate in those ministries, but rest assured we have been richly blessed to fully participate. God has not forgotten anyone.

It is not uncommon for employers to offer personality testing when hiring or building stronger employee teams. If you have taken the Myers-Briggs, Personalysis, DiSC, Spiritual Gift Inventory or any other interest inventory you have a jump start on an objective view of the ways you can participate in ministry. These personality types or inventories are a way of holding up a mirror and looking at the gift you have been given. Employers look at gifts and match talents with the task. The same can be done to find a satisfying opportunity to get involved in ministry within the parish or school community.

Another way to identify gifts is to celebrate strengths you see in others. Every par-

ish has people who are outgoing, thoughtful, organized or born leaders. Invite them to use those gift for the benefit of the parish. Everyone likes to be invited to ministry, especially young people. Most voung adults will not respond to a bulletin announcement asking for volun-

teers, but they will responded to a personal invitation to participate in an opportunity to serve the community. We are all on the journey together and we can aid each other by naming their gifts and asking them to contribute to the building of a more vibrant parish community.

Bishop Robert Morneau from the Diocese of Green Bay, WI was the closing speaker for the International Catholic Stewardship Conference and he reminded attendees to receive God's gifts gratefully, to nurture them responsibly, to share them justly and sacrificially and to return them abundantly.

This conference celebrated the 25th anniversary of Stewardship: A Disciple's Response, a pastoral letter from the United State Catholic Conference of Bishops. This visionary letter from the Conference calls Catholics to be strong stewards of the gifts we personally possess, but also all those gifts in our world. How are we treating the natural resources as well as the people around us. Are we stewards of ALL God has given.

This challenge has moved some parishes to initiate the formation of stewardship committees to help the parish community live the call to stewardship. These committees are not focused only on tithing efforts, but more of a complete definition of stewardship that focuses on prayer being the center of all efforts. Stewardship committees are called to help everyone share their gifts and participate in ministry as a way to become a more faith filled disciple.

Pray, participation and gratitude are components to a more vibrant parish. If you







Sister Laeticia is survived by her Benedictine community and many nieces and nephews.



Archbishop says Katrina ordeal prompted pastoral visit to Harvey victims

Texas City, TX (CNS) - Meandering slowly, retired New Orleans Archbishop Alfred C. Hughes greeted each student and teacher inside the Our Lady of Fatima Catholic School in Texas City. If it weren't for different logos on their uniforms, students of True Cross Catholic School in Dickinson were blending right in with Our Lady of Fatima students. True Cross students are meeting for classes and activities at Our Lady of Fatima while the Dickinson parish works on repairing damage to its facilities after Hurricane Harvey decimated the school and church. Nearly all 153 students made the temporary transition to Our Lady of Fatima's campus in nearby Texas City. The New Orleans archbishop visited the schools Sept. 25. Harvey dumped nearly 44 inches of rain in Dickinson, swelling the nearby bayou straight into True Cross. Our Lady of Fatima was spared, but Texas City still saw nearly 30 inches of rain. Both cities sit less than a half-hour drive from the Gulf Coast.

Bishops' migration chairman asks for extension of immigration status

Washington, D.C. (CNS) - The head of the U.S. bishops' Committee on Migration said some migrants from Honduras and El Salvador cannot safely return to their home countries in the near future and should have a special immigration permit extended. The U.S. government will consider in early November whether to extend, for some migrants hailing from the two countries, what's known as Temporary Protected Status, or TPS. The designation is for those who come to the U.S. from certain countries because of a natural disaster, continuing armed conflict or other extraordinary conditions. The status for Honduras and El Salvador is set to expire in early 2018. "There is ample evidence to suggest that current TPS recipients from Honduras and El Salvador cannot return safely to their home country at this time," said Bishop Joe S. Vasquez of Austin, Texas, chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on Migration.

Wisconsin parish's 'Apple Pie Ambassadors' welcome new neighbors

Monona, WI (CNS) - "Hello, we're from Immaculate Heart of Mary Parish in Monona. We understand that you recently moved into the area. We just wanted to welcome you to the neighborhood." That greeting -- along with an apple pie, a bulletin and a smile -- are what the parish's "Apple Pie Ambassadors" have given out nearly 50 times since May. Earlier this year, the Immaculate Heart of Mary Parish Council came up with the idea for the ambassadors to serve as a "welcome wagon" for people who recently moved into the area, both Catholics and otherwise. They are invited to check out the parish, which is in the Diocese of Madison, and they also are informed of some of the bigger events that have a presence in the neighborhood such as the parish festival and fish fries. An Immaculate Heart of Mary parishioner who is a realtor sends program leader Sharon Coffey a list of the new homes sold in Monona every month. "We'd eventually like to get to the whole parish boundaries," Coffey told the Catholic Herald, Madison's diocesan newspaper. "Right now, we're just getting started and we kind of want to feel our way through these houses (in Monona)."

Utah Catholics, Lutherans celebrate 'connectivity' of their churches

Salt Lake City, UT (CNS) - Bishop Oscar A. Solis told Lutherans and Catholics from parishes throughout the greater Salt Lake area gathered to pray together that he felt joyful and inspired "to see our unity and solidarity as one God's family. Especially, he said, "as we gather in prayer to give praise to our loving God and to invoke his blessings for all of us and for the world." The bishop of the Catholic Diocese of Salt Lake City and Bishop Jim Gonia of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America's Rocky Mountain Synod presided at the gathering at Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church, and each delivered a homily. Many clergy from both churches were in attendance. Congregants commemorated the 500th anniversary of the Reformation and celebrated the efforts at unity of the two churches in recent years. As the clergy processed in, many of those standing in the pews joined the choir in singing "In Christ Alone," a hymn familiar to members of both churches.

Minister general: Pilgrims imitate Franciscans' Holy Land hospitality

Jerusalem (CNS) - Franciscans serving in the Holy Land have had an impact on Christian pilgrims, said Franciscan Father Michael Perry, minister general of the order. "The Franciscans' care for pilgrims, their attention to detail, their efforts to demonstrate the love of God, the mercy of God through different religious services and ... how they welcome people in hospitality houses, these become elements that people themselves, Christians and others, take back to (their) countries," said Father Perry. Father Perry spoke to Catholic News Service in Jerusalem during official celebrations of the 800th anniversary of the presence of the Franciscans in the Holy Land. The celebration included three days of prayer, reflections, music and conference meetings, which discussed the history and archaeology of the Franciscans in the Holy Land. Cardinal Leonardo Sandri, head of the Vatican Congregation for Eastern Churches, was among those who attended. The service of the Franciscans "should be a call to go beyond division, a call to recognize each other truly as brothers and sisters belonging to the one same family, whether you call it family of God or the one human family," Father Perry told CNS following the celebrations' opening ceremony.

Faith brings hope even at moment of death, pope says

Vatican City (CNS) - Christians can find hope even at the hour of death, which faith teaches is not a closed door but a wide-open passage to a new life with Christ, Pope Francis said. While all men and women are "small and helpless in front of the mystery of death," Jesus' victory over death assures Christians of the joy of the resurrection, the pope said during his weekly general audience. Despite chilly temperatures in Rome, thousands gathered in St. Peter's Square to greet the pope who rode around St. Peter's Square in the popemobile, stopping frequently to greet pilgrims and kiss babies. Making sure one child was kept warm, the pope pulled up the hood of the baby's jacket before he was taken back to his parents. Continuing his series of talks on Christian hope, Pope Francis reflected on death, which is "a reality that our modern civilization tends to eradicate" so completely that "when death comes to us or those around us, we are unprepared."
