

he Jubilee Year of Mercy comes to a close on Sunday, November 20, the Solemnity of Christ the King. While the Door of Mercy at the Cathedral will be closed at the 11 a.m. Mass that day and physical pilgrimages will end, our personal need for mercy and our call to be merciful toward others will not. The theme for the Jubilee Year, "Merciful like the Father" should inspire us to continue on a daily spiritual pilgrimage with grateful hearts.

November is a time when we remember in special ways. In the Church the month is dedicated to recalling those saints and souls who went before and in whose legacy we live. Eternal rest grant unto them O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them.

As a nation we pray together in thanksgiving for the blessings we have received, including the gift of life. As someone said, "Life is the greatest bargain, we got it for nothing." In response we ought to recommit ourselves to defending life for others, especially the unborn and the vulnerable elderly. And we ought to gratefully live our lives praying for and helping our brothers and sisters in need.

Pope Francis speaking to doctors noted, "There is no human life more sacred than another, just as there is no human

life qualitatively more significant than another. The credibility of a healthcare system is not measured solely by efficiency, but above all by the attention and love given to the person whose life is always sacred and inviolable. Never fail to ask the Lord and the Virgin Mary for the strength to accomplish your work well and to bear witness courageously to the Gospel of life." That encouragement applies to all of us whatever our vocation or work.

We also pray in thanksgiving for the gift of freedom we enjoy in a unique way in our country. Sadly this blessing is not secure as some in government, education, media and business seek to restrict it by the heavy hand of law or intimidation. Let us recommit ourselves to defend religious liberty and freedom of conscience which is the bedrock on which a stable society is built.

This month may we also remember and give thanks to all those who help and support us every day.

Recently such recognition took on special meaning for me personally. Racing down the steps in the bishop's house at a pace reserved for those younger, I slipped, fell and hit my head on the railing, causing a deep cut. In a time of vulnerability I experienced the steady and professional hands of first responders, emergency room personnel, and the concern and support of staff and friends. With embarrassment and bruised pride (I was not able to wear a mitre for several days) my gratitude towards those who accompany me every day in so many ways is deeper than before. This Thanksgiving you might reflect on those who stand by you each day, especially in those times when vulnerable.

There is a story I like which reminds us that we do not need to do great things to have a lasting and consoling impact on others, but as Saint Mother Teresa suggested, by doing little things with love, seeing Jesus in others: "The pastor received a letter marked, 'Please give to Harry the Usher.' This is what was in it.

"Dear Harry, I'm sorry I do not know your last name, but then you don 't know mine. I'm Gert, Gert at the ten o'clock Mass every Sunday. I'm writing to ask you a favor. I don't know the priests too well, but somehow feel close to you. I don't know how you got to know my first name, but every Sunday you smile and greet me by name, and we exchange a few words: how bad the weather is, how much you like my hat, and how I am late on a particular Sunday. I just wanted to thank you for taking the time to remember an old woman, for the smiles, for your consideration, and for your thoughtfulness.

"Now for the favor. I am dying, Harry. My husband has been dead for sixteen years. And the kids are scattered. It is very important to me that when they bring me into church for the last time, you will be there to say, 'Hello Gert, good to see you.' If you are there Harry, I will feel assured that your warm personality will be duplicated in my new home in heaven.. With love and gratitude. Gert." (Bausch)

Thank you Gert for your example of gratefulness and for your reminder about those to whom we ought to share our own gratitude.

There is an old amusing "prayer" written by the ever popular anonymous: "Lord, bless us for our thank-less-ness, lest Thou bless us for our thank-ful-ness, and we starve." May this November be one filled with good memories of those who have touched our lives in the past and with gratitude for those who touch our lives each day.

May we also with grateful hearts thank God the Father for the gift of life, God the Son for his saving sacrifice, institution of the Church, and his presence in the sacraments most profoundly in the Holy Eucharist, and God the Holy Spirit for his guidance and protection.





It takes courage to be open

hese past months I have been reflecting on the five regrets often felt by those who are dying as they have been identified by hospice nurses.

The first regret is, "I wish I had let myself be happier."

The second is: "I wish I had stayed in touch with my friends."

The third is: "I wish I'd had the courage to express my feelings."

My best friend and his wife have a little girl. She is two years old. She is beautiful and funny and it is an absolute delight to spend time with her when I stay at their house during National Guard drill weekends.

She has moved from being shy when I first arrive, to running to the door yelling my name; and there are few welcomes which are more heartwarming, even if she immediately looks around me to see if I brought the dogs.

One of the things I have found most interesting in watching her grow is watching her personality develop. Slowly, she is becoming her own person and each time I come to visit there is a bit more to discover. She is developing likes and dislikes and she has learned the magical word "no," which is essential for any two year old.

Mostly she is slowly beginning to experience a full range of human emotions. Now, many of them and the nuances of emotion, will grow and mature with her, but right now, she has the basic four down pat: mad, glad, sad and scared.

The last weekend I was there I had the opportunity to experience a variation of all four of them, mostly glad, which is nice. But what I find the most interesting is the full force of her emotions as she feels them. I never once wondered what she was feeling, even with a limited vocabulary, everyone around her has an absolute understanding of her feelings.

I know as well that she will grow up and learn the complexity of emotions as they develop, and she will learn to control them, as all of us had to do. But what I hope is that she learns the difference between control and repression.

It is easy to confuse the two, and presume that we are supposed to learn to bury our

feelings, to mistrust them, deny them and refuse to share them. We may even think this is a good, maybe even a strong and noble thing, but it isn't. All that happens when we repress and hide our feelings is that people never know what we are thinking, and we feel utterly alone, unknown and isolated.

This is not a great way to live, but it is the way most of us live, and often the way we are taught to live.

Why?

I think the interesting word in this regret is that the dying wished they had the "courage" to express their feelings. Courage is a good word because it is fear that teaches us to repress, to not express our feelings. We are afraid of being weak, of being vulnerable, of losing control. This fear keeps us from being fully human, and so those around us have to guess what we are feeling, and they never know us the way we wish to be known.

There is no great strength, or nobility, in repressing the human expression of ourselves. In fact, it may allow wounds to fester, grudges to grow, and it will keep us from being open to the love that is given us by others, and by the Lord.

It takes courage to be open to our emotional lives, it takes courage and strength to be vulnerable enough to be known and loved. When we speak out the words that express our fears, our angers and our sorrows, we find our hearts are set free, and we are no longer slaves to the hidden pain within us.

When we express our joys, we find those joys doubled in the sharing.

Those who are drawing near to death often look back and wish they had the courage to be human, to be what they were called to be, to be known.

They are also drawing near to the Lord, who in the fullness of His humanity, embraced the gift of His human emotions, expressing His fears, His angers, His sadness and His joys. It is one of the ways that He is fully human, while being fully God. He models for us the courage needed to not simply be alive, but to live.

That means letting go of our fear, that means taking the risk.

That means being known.

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

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


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CHRIST SHOWS US THAT DEATH DOES NOT HAVE TO BE FEARED, BUT IT DOES HAVE TO BE EXPERIENCED

Today's culture most often treats death as something to be avoided, hidden or if a person has no more utility, hastened.

Many run to the extremes, doing absolutely everything to prevent death and any sign of it or deciding to end life "on our own terms".

Neither extreme recognizes that the dignity of the human person comes from God the Creator, who calls us to natural death in his time, not ours.

"There is good news," said Fr.
Thomas Fitzpatrick. "We began to
prepare very early in life for the
moment of our earthly death through
the Sacraments. Hopefully, the
thought of death to the Christian is
the culmination of our life on earth to
present our soul to God for eternal life
with Him."

"Not only do we follow Christ when we are healthy and young, but also all the way through the suffering and heartache of death. We can join in His redemptive suffering in the midst of the emotional pain and heartache that the experience of a loved one's death brings and be confident in hope that our faith in Christ will lead us to where God has called us all to be," said Fitzpatrick, a priest of the diocese currently completing his Licentiate in Sacred Theology.

"People who work in Hospice often say 'people die the way they live' and in my years of ministering to the dying I have found this to be true," said Cathy Kellogg, Hospice Manager for Avera@Home in Sioux Falls and Flandreau, SD, Sibley, IA and the Dougherty Hospice House. "Much of what I have learned is a new clarity about what really is important and living the most in each moment," she said.

"Birth and death are the two biggest events in one's life and can help to teach us of the true purpose of life, which is nothing less than union with God in Heaven," said Fitzpatrick.

"Christ shows us that death does not have to be feared, but it does have to be experienced. It is an intense participation in the life of Christ that is a mysterious exercise in the three theological virtues of faith, hope and charity that God gives us as an integral part of our journey to Him," he said.

In a recent homily, Fr. D'Cruz Nicholas spoke about a parishioner who died who had become a good friend.

"She was a person who had a tremendous gift of faith and courage; in fact I kept visiting her because in the midst of suffering her deep faith, sense of humor and love was such a powerful witness to me," said Fr. Nicholas, the associate pastor at St. Michael Parish, Sioux Falls.

"She kept asking me to come back and pray with her till her final moments. Thus these pastoral encounters have ended up being moments of profound grace because the dying faithful manifested such deep faith, courage and peace," he said.

Pope Francis spoke of the power of attending to the sick and dying in his 2015 message for the World Day of the Sick.

but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Mt 20:28). Jesus himself said: "I am among you as one who serves" (Lk 22:27).

"With lively faith let us ask the Holy Spirit to grant us the grace to appreciate the value of our often unspoken willingness to spend time with these sisters and brothers who, thanks to our closeness and affection, feel more loved and comforted.

"How great a lie, on the other hand, lurks behind certain phrases which so insist on the importance of "quality of life" that they make people think that lives affected by grave illness are not worth living," Pope Francis said.

"People immersed in the mystery of suffering and pain, when they accept these in faith, can themselves become living witnesses of a faith capable of embracing suffering, even without being able to understand its full meaning," he said.

Even after decades of hospice work, for Kellogg the pope's words became most real with the approaching passing of her father, Bernard Kayser earlier this year.

"Because of my experience in Hospice since 1985 it was always important to me and also to my family to talk with my parents about their wishes for end of life care," she said.

"As we were celebrating their 60th wedding anniversary, my parents requested a meeting with their 14 children. My dad had taken notes about what they as a couple wanted to share because he thought he might be too emotional to speak when we gathered.

"Dad was emotional, so he started the conversation and then when the tears came my youngest brother Kenny took over and became my parent's voice from dad's notes. Throughout this precious time together our parents were able to express their profound love and gratitude to us. They spoke of how blessed they feel, how faith sustained them and how they trusted in God's plans going forward.

"They made their wishes known regarding the type of medical care they would want in the years ahead. I believe I can speak for all my siblings that this time together was so precious; it did not make us sad, it only strengthened our bond and increased 100 fold our assurance that we truly knew our parents' wishes and would be able to honor those wishes when the time came," Kellogg said.

"In May of 2016, Dad's heart started to fail quite rapidly. Dad went from living a largely independent life with mom to being dependent on his family and paid caregivers. His once very sharp mind and quick wit was replaced many times with "being in a fog."


"He mourned the loss of driving his own car and jumping in the "gator" with mom to check on the activity in the area. A sadness was prevalent that was foreign to the fully engaged and impassioned father I knew all my life.

"One day we had a heart to heart about the many legacies he was leaving to his children. I reminded my father that all my life I had learned a lot about how to live from his examples and at this precious time as he was saying good-bye to us, he was once again showing us by example how to die," she said.

"My dad paused, shook his head slowly, and acknowledged this truth. I sensed a shift in my dad that day. For that next week as my mother and my siblings and their families cared for my dad, he shared his deep love for all of us by word and action and very peacefully and with prayer and a circle of family connection that was a bond of immense strength, dad did indeed show us how to die as a good and faithful servant," said Kellogg.

Though not talking about the Kayser

family, Fr. Nicholas in his homily said it this way, "the witness of the family bond and their care and support for their loved ones and the tremendous faith of the sick and those dying have also strengthened my own faith and hope."

"Jesus says a tiny bit of faith, like the mustard seed is enough, but we can also lose this tiny seed of faith if we don't feed our faith, if we don't put our faith in practice by making acts of faith.

Our encounters with people with tremendous faith, the sacraments, Eucharist and our personal prayers are powerful ways and means by which our faith is strengthened and deepened," he said.


Sometimes we speak about "this life" and the "next life". Fr Fitzpatrick encourages a different perspective.

"Our eternal life doesn't begin at the moment of our death. It began at the

moment of our conception. So we are living our eternal life right here and now," he said.

"In a way, November is family month in the Church as we remember and pray for our deceased relatives and friends and the souls in Purgatory. The Solemnity of All Saints reminds us of the Heavenly Banquet we are all called to," Fitzpatrick said.

"It is a month to remember how all Creation is gearing up for the New Creation to come. In the same way the seasons change and November seems to foreshadow an end before a new beginning; we take a spiritual clue from the

processes and seasons of the earth and apply them to our own human frailty."

"A parishioner popped in one day, sat down in my office and said quite frankly 'Father, I'm dying and I want to do it well", said Fitzpatrick.

"This was the kind of man that never ran from anything his whole life. What ensued over the next 8 months was a wonderful tutelage not only in 'dying well' but more so the way the gifts of grace are present and real when we need them most. This wonderful man was ready to go to God because he knew that putting his affairs in order meant his soul first and foremost. It was a lesson for all of us involved with his dying and an affirmation for his family that our faith is founded on reality...the reality of Christ and the call to heaven. He didn't run from death, but met it headon and experienced what we pray for in the fourth glorious mystery of the Rosary; the grace of a happy death," he said.

THE GIFT OF PERPETUAL PRAYER; MONASTERY EFFORT MOVING AHEAD

For the entire history of the Diocese of Sioux Falls, anyone who has had the privilege of being close to or affiliated with a religious community has known the power of their prayer.

That is also true for those connected to the newest religious community in the diocese, the Perpetual Adoration Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament. When Nancy Ann Kadinger was dealing with cancer in 2011, her pastor, Cathedral of Saint Joseph rector Father Thomas Fitzpatrick assured her of his prayers, but also said, "I'm going to get the sisters to pray for you."

After months in the hospital, including rehab, Kadinger finally got back home and gives credit to all who prayed for her, especially the Sisters.

"Quite frankly, they were the driving force in my recovery," she said.

"I knew from the Cathedral bulletin about them, that they were praying and adoring the Eucharist 24/7," Kadinger said. "I remember thinking what a gift that we have these women that are praying for the Church and our diocese."

Her illness and the Sisters' prayers for her recovery made the power of that prayer very real for her. "Until it comes into your life and you really need prayer, you take advantage of it I think. I never will again. Prayer, and the people who pray, like the sisters, their intercession to God, it's a living thing...it's what keeps me going," she said.

The Perpetual Adoration Sisters have been in the diocese since 2002, living all that time in the former Cathedral rectory. The current effort to build a permanent monastery on the Cathedral campus continues with good success, but with additional support needed before the final commitment to build can be made.

Chaplain Andrew Young, LT, USN: Life as a Navy chaplain

Hello from the USS WASP stationed in the Mediterranean Sea.

Life in the Navy as a Roman Catholic priest, serving our Sailors and Marines as a Chaplain, has been everything but routine.

Upon graduation from Mitchell High School, I attended the U.S. Naval Academy and was commissioned an officer in the U.S. Marine Corps. I served nearly six years in the Corps and eventually returned to the Diocese of Sioux Falls as a seminarian. Hard to believe that six years later I was ordained a Catholic Priest and began my three years of service at the Cathedral of Saint Joseph. What a wonderful three years ministering to the "Northenders" and serving as the Chaplain at O'Gorman Junior High School.

I couldn't have asked for a better three years serving the people by offering the Sacraments and growing in my own knowledge of being and living out the ministry of the priesthood. Given my military background, I asked Bishop Swain to be released for a period of time to the Military Archdiocese in order to serve as a Navy Chaplain.

Why? Good question. In my own time serving in the Marine Corps, I saw the importance of the Chaplain who is called to serve all the people but specifically minister to his own. Not having a priest while I was preparing to enter into combat operations in Afghanistan and Iraq was troubling. No priest to offer the Sacraments. No priest to hear my Confession - you know I wanted (and needed) that Sacrament given

before the dangerous mission we were to encounter. No priest to consecrate the Eucharist. Don't these men and women who sacrifice so much for our nation deserve better? I thought, maybe I could provide some service and fill a gap for a undesignated period of time - bringing our Sailors and Marines the Sacraments, which I was unable to receive when I needed them most. That request to serve as a Chaplain is what landed me on the Amphibious Landing Ship, USS WASP and a sea tour deploy for six months.

My time as a Navy Chaplain has been, honestly,

hard. Leaving friends and family to fulfill what many describe a call within a call. Not only answering the call to be a priest, but also to leave what little I do have, to serve in the military. As a Chaplain, I carry out a variety of responsibilities on a day to day basis. The most important part of my day (and highlight) is praying Mass, Monday through Saturday at 1100 in the small Chapel we have onboard.

One may ask, how many Sailors and Marines would attend Mass on a daily basis? It might surprise you, but we can have anywhere from 5 to 15 attending Mass on any given day. Weekends consist of three Sunday Masses spread throughout the day to try to accommodate the many different

schedules that the ship's crew must maneuver – remember, a ship never stops operating. The rest of the days consist in counseling the crew members on challenges they are facing, daily devotions such as the Rosary and Divine Mercy Chaplet, Confessions, Eucharistic Adoration and Catholic Education classes.

One of the most rewarding things has been helping over 15 Sailors and Marines become Catholic or complete their Sacraments in the Church. We are going to have a great celebration in December which will consist of adult

Baptisms, First Communions and Confirmations – a day I very much look forward to.

Given that there are only two Catholic priests serving as Chaplains in the entire region (Mediterranean, Red Sea, Persian Gulf), often times I get to ride the "Holy Helo" to another ship to offer Mass and the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Those Catholic congregations are so welcoming and excited to be able to have Mass.

This deployment has had its challenges though in accomplishing this mission since we are not collocated with many other ships, so taking a helicopter to another ship is not possible. In the interim, we have had Video Tele-Conferences (VTC) with those ships - I say Mass in a conference room on live video and different ships enter into the conference. Not the optimum since they are unable to receive the Eucharist, but sometimes it is the best we can do. This past weekend I had a VTC Mass with a ship who has not had a Catholic priest on board since June 25th. Imagine not having the possibility, at all, for any Sacraments for nearly four months and counting.

The life of a Navy Chaplain – always changing, but essential. Pray for our Sailors and Marines and for the many sacrifices they make to defend our nation. Give thanks for the opportunities you have to encounter Christ and receive Him in the Blessed Sacrament daily – not everyone is so lucky.





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

Syrian refugees still suffering months after blasts at border Qaa, Lebanon (CNS) - When a series of bombs exploded in a Lebanese Christian village near the Syrian border in June, it not only changed the lives of the victims and their families, but also the lives of Syrian refugees living nearby. In a government effort to prevent any future attacks, a Lebanese town that was once a lifeline for Syrians for education, activities and friendships has now been cut off from the local Syrian community. "Before the bombings, we had nearly 350 Syrian children coming to our center every day for classes and activities," said Father Elian Nasrallah, a priest at St. Elias Melkite Catholic Church, located just footsteps from the attacks three months ago. Before that, the community center hosted both Syrian and Lebanese children, who learned and played together and celebrated one another's holidays. The priest said they will reopen the center later in October, even under high security and tensions. Although tourism is slowly returning to the area, with Lebanese from different parts of the country visiting for hunting trips and barbecues, tensions remain between the Lebanese government tasked with protecting its citizens and an increasingly frustrated Syrian refugee community that feels stifled by suspicion restrictions.

Even in midst of trials, Jesus never deserts faithful, pope says **Vatican City (CNS)** - Following Christ may take a person down a path that leads to anguish, isolation, even martyrdom, but a Christian will never feel bitterness or regret because Christ never leaves his or her side, Pope Francis said in a morning homily. In his homily during Mass at Domus Sanctae Marthae, the pope focused on the day's reading from St. Paul's Second Letter to Timothy (4:10-17) in which the apostle sadly takes note of those who deserted him. However, "the Lord stood by me and gave me strength," the verse says. "The life of the great Paul ends in desolation, not in resentment and bitterness, but with internal grief," the pope said. In fact, many other martyrs like St. Peter, St. John the Baptist and St. Maximilian Kolbe, he said, died abandoned by so many, but they drew their strength from Jesus, who they knew was by their side.

Mercy offered to driver after accident that took life aids healing Washington, DC (CNS) - The driver of a vehicle who caused the death of a Washington Catholic high school student said the compassion shown to her after the accident by the boy's parents was the "most profound" experience of grace she has felt in her life. The driver, Margaret "Maggie" Baisley, was a 24-year-old doctoral student in clinical psychology at the time of the November 2014 crash that killed Dominik Pettey, who attended Jesuit-run Gonzaga College High School in Washington. She said she became humbled and changed in a "billion different ways" when his parents, Magdalena and Patrick Pettey, showed mercy by offering their prayers and by asking a local prosecutor not to charge her with manslaughter. Baisley said the parents' request to meet with her and express concern for her well-being led to a positive change in all of her relationships, professionally and personally. The greatest gift the parents gave, Baisley said, was to let her feel forgiven for her connection to the "worst possible thing you could do: be responsible for the death of another person.

Act to process refugees, bishop tells Canadian government Ottawa, Ontario (CNS) - The president of the Canadian bishops' conference has written a frank letter to the federal immigration minister urging immediate government action to unclog delays in processing refugee applicants to preserve confidence in the refugee sponsorship program. Bishop Douglas Crosby, president of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops, wrote Immigration Minister John McCallum to say many sponsoring groups have become frustrated due to long wait times and money spent on refugee families that have yet to arrive. "Needless to say, delayed arrivals and the lack of clear and transparent communication about the status of pending cases poses the risk of undermining the faith of Canadians in the government's ability to follow through on its promises," Bishop Crosby wrote in a letter dated Oct. 6.

Mass in Yellowstone 'an experience of God unlike any other,' says Jesuit

Yellowstone National Park, WY (CNS) - Jesuit Father Rick Malloy very much enjoys summers in Yellowstone National Park. "I'm a fanatical fisherman," he admitted. "And a good one, too." But exceptional fishing is not the main thing that brings him to Wyoming summer after summer. He said it's the privilege and beauty of park ministry that keeps him coming back. Mass in Yellowstone is "an experience of God unlike any other," he said. "It's a real privilege to be able to celebrate the Eucharist with people here in the park." Father Malloy is a cultural anthropologist, professor and chaplain at the Jesuit-run University of Scranton in Pennsylvania. For the past seven summers, he has gone west to minister in Yellowstone.

Memorial where Moses saw Promised Land reopens Mount Nebo, Jordan (CNS) - The Memorial of Moses on Mount Nebo has reopened its doors to the public amid festivities, after nearly a decade of restoration. Believed by ancient tradition to be the site where Moses saw the Promised Land and died, a church and monastery are perched atop this 3,300foot rugged mountain facing the northern end of the Dead Sea. It has drawn Christian pilgrims throughout the centuries and is considered one of the most important pilgrimage, tourist, and archaeological sites in Jordan and the Holy Land. Cardinal Leonardo Sandri, the special envoy of Pope Francis and prefect of the Congregation for Eastern Churches, said he was thrilled to officiate at a place of great spiritual significance to Jews, Muslims and Christians alike. "The spiritual treasures that this place holds today are returned to Jordan and to humanity," Cardinal Sandri told an Oct. 16 gathering of some 500 dignitaries, including Jordanian Tourism Minister Lina Annab, Bedouin leaders, foreign diplomats and top Catholic officials in the Middle East. Excavations led by the Franciscan Custody of the Holy Land, which acquired the area in 1932, have uncovered significant remains of an early basilica -- built in 597 on fouth-century church foundation -and Byzantine mosaic pavements.
