

A reading from the Book of the Prophet Jeremiah



Second Reading Acts 8:26-40

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

Then the angel of the Lord spoke to Philip, "Get up and head south on the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza, the desert route." So he got up and set out. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, that is, the queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury, who had come to Jerusalem to worship, and was returning home. Seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. The Spirit said to Philip, "Go and join up with that chariot." Philip ran up and heard him reading Isaiah the prophet and said, "Do you understand what you are reading?" He replied, "How can I, unless someone instructs me?" So he invited Philip to get in and sit with him. This was the scripture passage he was reading: "Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and as a lamb before its shearer is silent, so he opened not his mouth. In (his) humiliation justice was denied him. Who will tell of his posterity? For his life is taken

from the earth." Then the eunuch said to Philip in reply, "I beg you, about whom is the prophet saying this? About himself, or about someone else?" Then Philip opened his mouth and, beginning with this scripture passage, he proclaimed Jesus to him. As they traveled along the road they came to some water, and the eunuch said, "Look, there is water. What is to prevent my being baptized?" Then he ordered the chariot to stop, and Philip and the eunuch both went down into the water, and he baptized him. When they came out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away, and the eunuch saw him no more, but continued on his way rejoicing. Philip came to Azotus, and went about proclaiming the good news to all the towns until he reached Caesarea.

Rite of Ordination

Election of the Candidate

The candidates are called by name and testimony is offered as to their worthiness.

<u>Bishop:</u> Relying on the help of the Lord God and our Savior Jesus Christ, we choose these men, our brothers, for the Order of the Diaconate.

Assembly: Thanks be to God. (with reverent applause)

Homily-Instruction

Promise of the Elect

The elect rise and stand before the bishop. They are asked questions that declare their intention to undertake the Office of the Diaconate. Each candidate resolves to consecrate himself for ministry, live in a humble and charitable way, proclaim the faith in word and deed, faithfully pray the Liturgy of the Hours, and conform himself to the example of Christ, whose minister he will soon become. Each candidate also makes the promise to live in a state of celibacy in imitation of Jesus.

Promise of Obedience

The elect go to the bishop and kneeling before him places his joined hands between those of the bishop, promising respect and obedience to him and his successors.

Litany of Supplication

The elect prostrate themselves as a sign of their humility toward the office they are about to receive, in recognition of their need for God's grace, and to call on the aid of the Communion of Saints.

Litany of Supplication



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Laying on of Hands

Each elect rises and kneels before the bishop. The bishop lays his hands on the elect's head in silence.

Prayer of Ordination

The bishop extends his hands over the elect as he prays the Prayer of Ordination.

Investiture with Stole and Dalmatic

The newly ordained are vested with the deacon's stole and dalmatic. The stole is the symbol of their office in the Church as a deacon. The dalmatic, which is in the form of a cross, refers to the Passion of Christ. It symbolizes joy, salvation, and justice.

Handing on of the Book of Gospels

Vested as deacons, the newly ordained kneel before the bishop. The bishop places the Book of the Gospels in each of their hands.

Fraternal Kiss

The bishop gives the newly ordained the fraternal kiss, a sign of peace and unity. All the deacons present do likewise.










The Communion Rite

Communion Antiphon




Reception of Holy Communion
